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PAST PRESIDENT'S LETTER

As we close the chapter on another year of service, it's remarkable to reflect on how much we've accomplished together. What began twelve months ago as a commitment to lead with purpose has grown into a year shaped by teamwork, perseverance, and a shared belief in strengthening the real estate profession across Montana.

Protecting Property Rights Through Legislative Action

This year brought several defining policy victories—wins made possible because REALTORS® across the state showed up, spoke up, and stood together.

- **Defeated SB 358**, would have eliminated exempt well use across Montana, significantly restricting responsible land use and development, reducing property values and limiting new housing supply while driving up future home prices.
- **Passed SB 101**, delivering meaningful protections for homeowners facing squatting issues.
- **Advanced subdivision reform through HB 714**, clarifying family transfers and reducing unnecessary barriers.

These efforts not only protected property owners—they reinforced the role REALTORS® play in shaping Montana's future. And while we celebrate these successes, we also prepare for the next session, knowing discussions around water rights, wells, and property taxes will require the same unity and resolve.

Progress in Governance and Member Support

We made significant strides on governance restructure this year. With the framework approved,

our association management team is now translating that vision into policy. In 2026, the Board of Directors will review the proposed changes, with implementation scheduled to begin in 2027. It's careful, intentional work—and it positions us for a stronger, more efficient future. Education also evolved in meaningful ways. Our refreshed GRI program now offers a shorter in-person requirement and the flexibility for members to choose from a suite of approved courses. This modernized structure supports lifelong learning while respecting the realities of a busy profession.

Building a More Informed Voice for Montana

Through expanded data collection, we strengthened our ability to advise policymakers with accurate, real-time insight. These efforts ensure decisions about housing, land use, and community development are informed by the people who know these markets best—Montana REALTORS® around water rights, wells, and property taxes will require the same unity and resolve.

A Year Defined by Relationships

Beyond the policy wins and program updates, what stands out most from this year is the deepening of our REALTOR® community

Across committees, meetings, and long work sessions, relationships grew—some newly formed, others strengthened by shared purpose. Legislative Recap

During the 2025 Legislative Session the Montana Association of REALTORS® tracked hundreds of bills and with your continued engagement and outreach, we helped shape outcomes on major issues — from water rights to zoning and permitting reform and housing investment — while staying vigilant on tax and regulatory policies that impact the business of real estate.

Recent changes to Montana's property tax system under [SB 542](#) and [HB 231](#) have added new layers of complexity that make it harder for homeowners and property owners to clearly understand how taxes are calculated and who ultimately bears the burden.

These bills significantly restructure tax rates, introduce multi-phase implementation, and rely on tiered valuations and shifting mill levies to address the impacts of recent reappraisals.

While we appreciate the Legislature's efforts to reduce tax burdens for primary homeowners, we are also observing unintended consequences from these policies that are affecting many long-time Montana residents.

Rapidly increasing property values over the last several years have already put pressure on household budgets, and the new tax structure shifts a greater share of the burden to higher-value residential properties and commercial properties, creating uncertainty and strain across the housing and business landscape.

MAR will continue to work with legislators and stakeholders to address these unintended impacts and to find a clearer, more predictable, and more equitable long-term solution to Montana's property tax challenges.

MAR also remains steadfast in our support for the responsible use of exempt wells.

During the 2025 legislative session, MAR worked diligently to stop harmful proposals that would have eliminated exempt well use across Montana, recognizing the vital role they play in providing water access for homes in rural and underserved areas.

We will continue to advocate for responsible water use while respecting senior water right holders and protecting private property rights.

With the recent lawsuit filed by the League of Cities and Towns challenging the 53-year-old law that allows de minimis water use from exempt wells for housing where no other water options exist, we are concerned about the potential consequences of overturning a long-standing policy.

It is difficult to imagine that a law in place for over five decades—mirrored by similar exempt well laws in 15 other western states—could suddenly be deemed unconstitutional.

MAR will continue to support the responsible use of exempt wells and work with legislators and stakeholders to find a practical, long-term solution in the next legislative session.

Thank you for being a vital part of our efforts this session. When MAR members speak up, policymakers listen—and it's your voice that helps protect property rights and promote homeownership across our state!

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Legal Update

Property Tax Changes

The Montana Legislature recently passed legislation ([House Bill 231](#) and [Senate Bill 542](#)) which raised the tax burdens on non-owner-occupied residential properties such as second homes, vacation homes, and short-term rentals. The bills, which were signed into law by Governor Gianforte on May 12, 2025:

- Established a \$400 tax rebate for residential property owners for tax year 2024.
- Implemented a temporary, graduated tax rate for tax year 2025.
- Raised residential property tax rates from 1.35% to 1.9% for tax year 2026 and after, unless the residential property qualifies as a “homestead” or a “long-term rental” (essentially, if was occupied for at least 7 months during the calendar year).

Homes classified as homesteads or long term rentals will be taxed at tiered rates ranging from 0.76% to 1.9%, depending on their value relative to the state’s median home value.

The new tax burdens will take full effect in tax year 2026 and will be reflected in tax bills sent out in the fall of 2026. The Montana Department of Revenue’s statewide property appraisal for the 2025-2026 biennium is also anticipated to raise the value of all residential properties beginning in tax year 2025. Therefore, property tax bills for 2024 and prior years may not reflect the future tax burdens on non-owners occupied residential properties. MAR members are encouraged to notify potential buyers of such properties about the possible future tax burdens.

Exempt Wells Lawsuit

A coalition of plaintiffs — including the Montana League of Cities and Towns, Montana Farm Bureau Federation, Trout Unlimited, several environmental organizations, and individual

landowners — has filed suit against the State of Montana and the Department of Natural Resources and Conservation (DNRC). The lawsuit challenges Montana’s long-standing “exempt well” law, which allows small groundwater wells to be developed without a full permitting process.

If the plaintiffs are successful, the court could halt the use of exempt wells across much of the state. In many rural and developing areas of Montana, exempt wells are the only viable source of water for new homes. Removing this option would significantly slow — and in some places effectively stop — home building altogether.

The consequences would be serious:

- Fewer new homes built, especially in rural and growing communities
- A sharp reduction in housing supply over the coming years
- Increased pressure on already high home prices
- Housing becoming even less affordable for Montana families.

The Montana Association of REALTORS® intends to intervene in this lawsuit. While the State of Montana and DNRC are named as defendants, it is important to note that DNRC actively supported SB 358 during the 2025 legislative session — legislation that would have banned exempt wells across much of Montana. Because we cannot rely solely on parties that previously pushed for an exempt well ban to defend this law, it is critical that REALTORS® have a seat at the table to ensure the housing, property rights, and affordability impacts are fully represented.

MAR’s role as an intervener will be to advocate for the continued availability of exempt wells, protect the ability to build homes, and defend housing supply and affordability for current and future Montanans. MAR is joined by coalition partners in this effort.

This year marked a significant association milestone, 115 years of service to REALTORS® and the community. BAR celebrated the occasion with a “BAR-thday Party,” honoring the history of the association and the members who have helped shape its legacy over more than a century.

BAR welcomed Hailey Waldon as Government Affairs Director, strengthening the association’s connection with local government and advocacy efforts. One of Hailey’s early successes was reintroducing the association’s city government “field trip,” giving REALTORS® the opportunity to tour city departments to gain better understanding of how local government operates.

BAR also added Shawnee Krauszer as Communications & Events Manager, bringing fresh perspective and energy to BAR events and programming. Shawnee assumed leadership of the Quality of Life Community Involvement Program, enhancing event execution and supporting BAR’s long-standing commitment to giving back through REALTOR®-led fundraising.

The most significant organizational achievement of 2025 was the restructuring of the Board of Directors. Following a comprehensive review of board composition and member representation, BAR reduced the board from 35 members to a more effective 12–15. This change allows for more meaningful discussion, increased accountability, and a more agile, visionary leadership structure.

Community impact remained a cornerstone of BAR’s mission, as the Quality of Life program surpassed \$1 million in cumulative donations to local non-profits since its inception in 2004. This milestone reflects more than two decades of REALTOR® generosity and dedication to strengthening communities throughout eastern Montana.

Our cherished “Velvet and Fur” Christmas Soiree fundraiser returned in December, which raised \$39,000 to support four local families in need.

Throughout 2025, HAR made significant strides in elevating professionalism and member connection. FAIR HOUSING

Fair Housing laws prohibit discrimination in all housing-related practices, including Rental, Advertising, Sales, Mortgage, Lending, Appraisal, and Insurance transactions, and the actions of Homeowners Associations.

FEDERAL PROTECTIONS

THE FAIR HOUSING ACT, enacted in 1968, prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, and financing of housing based on:

MONTANA PROTECTIONS

In addition to the Federal protected classes, Montana law protects three additional classes:

AGE	CREED	MARITAL STATUS
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Montana Department of Commerce states that fair housing is the right to choose a home free from unlawful discrimination.

FAIR HOUSING LAWS PROTECT YOU AGAINST INTIMIDATION, COERCION, AND HARASSMENT. Should you file a complaint of housing discrimination, federal and state Fair Housing laws prohibit retaliation. Local ordinances may provide additional protections.
